

Download Data and Images

Data can be exported as a CSV (spreadsheet), SVG or PNG (photos), or even GeoJSON (for GIS applications). To see what file types are available for export, **click on the bar graph icon** in the top right of a visualization.

Look for Map Labels

Hovering over areas of the map will display initial information, but there may be additional information. **Click directly on the map** to view the additional information. By clicking into different areas of the map, the label and all associated data for that given geography will be displayed.

Filter Visualizations

Hovering over a label on a visualization will immediately highlight the topic for focus. Sometimes it's helpful to view a few pieces in a more direct way. **Click directly on the label** to turn the filter on and off. You can then export the filtered visualization at its current view.

Share Hyperlinks

To link directly to a specific section on a page, hover over a heading or visualization. Two chain links should appear. Clicking on those links will move that heading or visualization to the top of the page, and you can then copy the link in the search bar to **use as a direct link to that section of a page**. You can also right click and select "copy link address."

You can bookmark the link, and email or share it on social media.

Data Methods and Limitations

The data in this dashboard represent 20 indicators across four main categories: Individuals with Greatest Need, Lack of Essential Supports, Child Care Access, and Community Conditions and Context. The recent pandemic disrupted data collection, analysis, and reporting, which may have impacted the representativeness, availability, and publication date of some major datasets. Timeframes for data sources may vary. However, each visualization and the data published in this dashboard reflect the **most recent and reliable data available**, capturing important information about community context and structural conditions.

In addition, data on some demographic groups may not be available due to a source's data collection methods or the need to respect respondent privacy. For this reason, data on demographic subgroups such as nation of origin may not be available. Differences within groups such as Asian-Americans, Hispanic, or others may exist but are not represented by the data in this dashboard. In addition, data collection methodology often requires respondents to select from a predetermined list of demographic characteristics. These predetermined groupings may not always accurately represent how a respondent identifies.

Lastly, it is important to note that the information presented here is descriptive, representing a point in time, and should not be interpreted as definite. Hearing directly from community members about current conditions is beneficial to community assessment and action planning. Adding local context can help tell the full story about your community.
